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### Paying for the MPH Program

The MPH Program is classified as a Tier 2 Professional Degree program at Cornell. The cost of the program for the class entering in August, 2016 is \$66,400 for students in the regular program and \$49,800 for students in the accelerated program. Consistent with professional degree programs within and beyond Cornell, program-sponsored financial assistance is rare. For this year, the MPH program does not anticipate offering any scholarships, bursaries, or TA-ships. If you would like to seek external funding support to offset your tuition costs, we suggest looking over the following resources.

#### Loans for all Graduate Students

The Graduate School currently participates in two federally funded graduate student loan programs: the William D. Ford Direct Loan and the Federal Graduate PLUS loan. These programs are available to U.S. citizens and permanent residents who are matriculated in the degree program.
